# THE DRAGON WORLDS ARRIVE IN ASIA: HONG KONG'S PIVOTAL ROLE

### A Rich Maritime Heritage

The Dragon class has a distinguished history in Hong Kong, with the first boats built locally in 1932. This makes Hong Kong home to the world's third oldest Dragon fleet. Apart from a brief interruption during the 1940s, the Dragon class has been a cornerstone of one-design keelboat racing at the Royal Hong Kong Yacht Club and across the city ever since. In 2022, the Hong Kong fleet celebrated its ninetieth anniversary, marking nearly a century of continuous sailing tradition.

### Recognition and Opportunity

In recognition of its longstanding contribution, Hong Kong was provisionally awarded the opportunity to host the first Asian World Championship. This decision was formally ratified in 2024, acknowledging the vital role of non-European fleets in upholding the "World" status of the Dragon class.

### Hong Kong: A Sailing Hub

Known as the Pearl of the Orient, Hong Kong has long been a major centre for maritime trade and finance, serving as a gateway between East and West. Beyond its commercial significance, Hong Kong is also a regional hub for recreational sailing. While many Asian countries have focused primarily on Olympic classes such as dinghies and skiffs, Hong Kong has embraced

keelboat racing. The city's Etchells fleet has twice hosted the World Championships, in 1997 and 2015, on the eastern race areas—venues well-tested for international competition, with marinas adjacent to the courses and clubs experienced in hosting major events.

### The 2025 Hong Kong Dragon Championship

The 2025 Hong Kong Dragon Championship took place on these renowned waters, featuring eighteen of the twenty-one-boat fleet in an eight-race series. Competitors faced challenging conditions, with rolling swells from the northeast, variable breezes, and unpredictable wind shifts as the wind gradually eased. Three races were completed on each of the first two days, with two more on the final day as the wind faded. The competition was intense, with the two Doomernik teams—both featuring professional sailors—separated by just two points at the finish. The next four boats were only five points apart, highlighting the close racing. With winds of ten to fifteen knots and temperatures ranging from eighteen to twenty-four degrees Celsius, sailors enjoyed Mediterranean-style "champagne sailing" in November—a time when even southern Europe is often cool and damp.

### Looking Ahead: The 2027 Hong Kong Dragon World Championship

Hong Kong is set to host the 2027 Dragon World Championship in November 2026, marking the largest one-design keelboat championship ever held in the region. The event is endorsed by the Hong Kong Tourism Board, the Hong Kong Sailing Federation, and the International Dragon Association. Organisers are actively securing government, local, and international sponsorship, with confirmed partners including Yanmar, the Royal Hong Kong Yacht Club, Clearwater Bay Golf & Country Club, the Hopewell Hotel, Code Zero, Central Oceans, and Sailors for the Sea.

Preceding the World Championship will be the inaugural Asia-Pacific Cup, designed to capture the spirit of the Gold Cup. Perhaps the most significant legacy of the 2027 event will be the ongoing negotiations with other Asian nations to establish new National Associations and fleets in the region.

### Conclusion

The arrival of the Dragon Worlds in Asia, and particularly in Hong Kong, is a testament to the city's enduring maritime tradition and its growing influence in international sailing. These events not only celebrate past achievements but also promise to inspire the next generation of sailors across Asia.



# Dirk Pramann

## The man who didn't give up!

**From a hospital prognosis that would have confined him to 'feeding birds in the park' to standing atop one of the most renowned International Dragon podiums, Dirk Pramann's 2025 season was a powerful reminder of what never giving up can truly mean.**

*What is it about Dragon racing that keeps you coming back?*

"It is the daily challenge of every race against nature. Nature presents me with ever-changing conditions. No two races are alike. You constantly have to adapt to new conditions and different situations, including those with your competitors. It is the fascination of being able to feel the boat and knowing when to power it and when to simply let her run. I love the challenge of having to improve every single day. In life, business and racing. But above all, the fascination of a One Design Class, like the Dragons."

*Dirk, could you take us back to the moment of your diagnosis? What did the doctors tell you, and what were your first thoughts when you heard the news?*

"The diagnosis hit me hard because it brutally showed me that my life might only last a few days. The complexity of the diagnosis, because it was truly a combination of many serious defects, really affected me. In the first few hours in the hospital, I had to sort out what decisions I still had to make. I blocked out the thought of death, thinking that I knew I would get through this situation with the doctors. I never doubted that I would not survive. Then they put me into a twelve-hour coma, and the doctors did an extraordinary job."

*You've spoken about leaving the hospital and being told you would 'only be able to feed the birds in the park.' How did that comment land with you, and what made you decide, 'No - that is not the goal of my life'?*

"My health after the operation in May 2023, and all my blood and vital signs, were so far from normal status, that any competent doctor could give me no other prognosis than that I should be content just to manage daily life without any handicaps. I believe that a doctor cannot make any other diagnosis than this prognosis, because the probability does not allow for any other conclusion. However, I was convinced that there must be doctors

in this world who could help me overcome the odds and, with a lot of discipline and great confidence, return to a reasonably normal state of health. I found these people, and they developed a program for me that I then followed with great discipline."

*"Never give up" has become your guiding motto. How did that mindset shape your recovery journey, both physically and mentally, and in what ways has it changed how you approach life and sailing today?*

"During that time, I learned that it is important to find people who are among the best in their field. Then, using your logic, you have to assess whether you can trust them and their competence.

Once you have found these people, you must trust them unconditionally. And at the same time, you have to work with all your might to improve your current situation. That is the motto I lived by in Dragon racing. It is important to note that the starting point is irrelevant. What I have achieved in terms of health and sailing performance, anyone can achieve. Truly anyone, regardless of their starting point.

If it is as difficult as mine, then it might take a little longer. But it always depends on how much energy you invest in the process and that you always believe in yourself and your team and never give up."

*This season with Ingrid has been remarkable - from winning the 2025 Gold Cup and stepping onto many podiums. Which moments from this year stand out most for you?*

"The Gold Cup is truly the event that has stayed with me the most. We were not doing well at all in the pre-regatta one week before the Gold Cup and I seriously doubted whether we do even make it into the top 30 participants. We were quite frustrated, measured the boat multiple times every day, and the principle of 'never give up' was key. Focus on your strengths, do what you do best every day, and do it consistently, and success will follow. That is what has stayed with me from that event, and it perfectly reflects what I experienced in terms of my health and recovery before the Gold Cup."

*Sailing a Dragon at the top international level demands*

*precision, teamwork, and resilience. How has your experience influenced the way you sail and lead your team on board Ingrid*

"With Michael Koch and Kilian Weise, I have an excellent team whom I trust unconditionally. Two keys have led us to success. First, intensive communication with honest and clear words on board, without losing respect for one another. Also, pointing out what is being done right or wrong.

And second, confidence in our own strengths. Consistency! Doing the same thing over and over again, every single day. That has shaped us, and the ability to rely on each other so completely that everyone does

their best for the team and for the result every second. That is how we will continue to sail, and I believe that consistency is the key how we have reached the podium in all following regattas."

*Looking ahead, what are your goals and dreams, both on and off the water? What message would you like to share with sailors and readers around the world who may be facing their own challenges?*

"My wish is to react calmly to all new challenges in regatta sailing and in my life. My message to the readers is: never let anything deter you from your goals, no matter your starting point and circumstances. Never give up!"

# PUERTO PORTALS, MALLORCA HOSTS 2026 DRAGON GOLD CUP



The Dragon Gold Cup 2026, to be held in Puerto Portals in Mallorca from March 14th to 21st, will mark a historic milestone for the Dragon Class: it will be the first time this prestigious event is hosted in Puerto Portals.

The island, renowned for its long-standing tradition in organising international sailing competitions, is ready to welcome the world's top Dragon teams in an event that promises elite sport, top-tier facilities, and a complete social experience.

The relationship between Puerto Portals and the Dragon Class dates back to 2017, when the venue hosted its first 'Copa del Mediterraneo' and the inaugural Dragon Winter Series. # IDA Approves use of GPS & Electronic Starting Systems



At the AGM in October 2025 the International Dragon Association delegates voted by a large majority to support allowing use of both full GPS devices and, separately, the use of an electronic 'Starting System'.

No specific system was endorsed at that time, and it is the intention of the IDA to allow organising authorities to trial the different systems that are available. We are also waiting for World Sailing to ratify our proposed change to the Class Rules to allow

these devices, and this is expected in early January 2026.

It is the IDA's current intention to purchase a start system controller (hardware and software) when adequate opportunities have been used to evaluate the available systems. The market is in rapid development and products (and prices) are changing rapidly. All the competing systems are currently available to rent, and we regard this as a prudent approach to find the

best system for longer term use by the IDA.

Assuming World Sailing approves our proposed Class Rule changes, the Organising Authorities for our major championships in 2026 (Gold Cup, Europeans, Worlds and Grade 1 events) will then be in a position to announce, in conjunction with the IDA, which system (if any) will be available to rent at each event.

## 2025 Dragon European Grand Prix Review

The 2025 Dragon European Grand Prix Series encompassed four regattas in Cascias, Lake Attersea, Skanor and Cannes and once again competition was fierce. Across the four regattas there were four different Overall and Corinthian winners and it all came down to the finals in Cannes.

Pedro Andrade claimed overall victory in Cascias, Xavier Vanneste in Attersee and Jan Woortman in

Skanor, but ultimately it was Jan Eckert, Torvar Mirsky and Federico Melo who won the Cannes Grand Prix and also became the winners of the 2025 European Dragon Grand Prix Series and the Standfast Trophy.

In the Corinthian Division, the individual grand prix winners were Christoph Skolaut, Peter Fröschl and Albin Boman with Martin Pålsson crewed by Victor Langström and

Christian Videbaek winning the Cannes Grand Prix and taking the overall Corinthian Series to win the Lowell Phyllis Cup.

The knockout European Grand Prix Grand Final also took place in Cannes where the winners, claiming the Sami Salomaa Flow Trophy, were Christoph Toepfer, Markus Koy and Ruairidh Scott.

## 2026 Dragon European Grand Prix Preview

The 2026 Grand Prix Series will start in Sanremo, Italy (April 15-18) before moving onto Lake Balaton, Hungary (May 13-16) for the second of the European Series. Our third Grand Prix will be combined with the British Edinburgh Cup in Cowes, Isle of Wight

# Asia Pacific Championship

At the 2023 IDA AGM, the proposal to launch an annual Asia Pacific Championship to promote the Dragon Class in the region was officially approved. In early 2024, we established a working committee, comprising representatives from Hong Kong, Australia, Japan, Canada, and the USA, to shape the event format and move the concept forward.

A core objective of the initiative was to develop a fleet racing event that reduces the need for costly and complex boat transportation across the vast Pacific region. Many Dragon sailors in Asia Pacific already participate in events like the AP Interport, which successfully use borrowed boats. Building on this model, we saw an opportunity to create an event that is more accessible, collaborative, and scalable.

To better understand how to structure such events, we consulted with the IOD Class, which has successfully run major regattas using a full borrowed-boat format. The model we're adopting is a round-robin fleet racing format, where competitors rotate through different boats each day, or half-day, depending on the venue. The host club is responsible for preparing all boats to a common standard (rigging, sails, etc.), removing

the need for measurement and encouraging local fleets to raise their game.

While insurance and logistics remain real challenges, the advantages of this model are compelling. It offers a cost-effective, environmentally conscious, and community-building alternative to traditional regattas. To help more clubs gain familiarity with the borrowed-boat format, we hosted a pilot invitational event between Hong Kong and Perth, bringing together one fleet with Interport experience and another new to the concept. The event gave both organizers and sailors a valuable opportunity to experience the format in action, identify best practices, and build confidence in this collaborative approach.

The Perth team came away from the event highly enthusiastic, impressed by both the racing and the camaraderie. They are now eagerly looking forward to hosting the return leg of the exchange, welcoming the Hong Kong team to Perth, further strengthening ties between the two fleets and continuing to build momentum for the borrowed-boat concept.

### A Model with Broader Impact

With the 2027 Dragon World

Championship scheduled for November 2026 in Hong Kong, we've decided to host the inaugural Asia Pacific Championship as a warm-up event. Since many competitors will already be shipping or chartering Dragons locally for the Worlds, this first edition will not follow the borrowed-boat format. However, it will serve as a crucial stepping stone, building visibility and laying the foundation for future editions.

Importantly, we see this initiative as more than just a regional solution. The borrowed-boat model has the potential to transform how Dragon events are run globally. Fleets in Europe, where clubs are spread across large distances, and in North and South America, where travel and logistics can limit participation, could benefit enormously from adopting similar formats. The Asia Pacific Championship can serve as a test case for a more inclusive, connected, and sustainable future for Dragon racing worldwide.

We're excited by the possibilities and invite Dragon sailors and clubs around the globe to stay tuned and consider how this model might work in your own region.

# Dragon To Celebrate 100th Anniversary

In early 1928, the Royal Gothenburg Yacht Club (GKSS) announced a design competition for a new cruising keelboat — one that should be relatively fast, externally attractive, and seaworthy. Out of this call for beauty and performance emerged a legend. On December 25, 1928, the eminent Norwegian yachtsman and designer Johan Anker was awarded the prize for what would become the Dragon class.

The first three Dragons, commissioned by GKSS, were built in Gothenburg by Hjalmar Johansson and raffled among club members in July 1929. That same summer, the inaugural regattas were sailed in Långedrag and Marstrand, marking the beginning of a story that would carry the Dragon across oceans and generations.

As we approach the Centenary Jubilee in 2029, the Dragons will return to these native waters — to celebrate not only a century of racing but a century of shared spirit. The event will be a Scandinavian collaboration, bringing together major yacht clubs and national Dragon associations to honor the legacy of this timeless design.

The Centenary Dragon Jubilee will embody the values that have defined the class since its inception: sportsmanship, elegance, and friendship. It will serve as a tribute to the Dragon's enduring ability to connect people across borders — through wars, revolutions, and technological leaps — while remaining faithful to its original ideals.

By joining forces across Scandinavia, we pool resources, knowledge, and expertise to create a world-class regatta that both honors the past and sets a new standard for the future.

Marstrand, with its unique maritime heritage and natural charm, offers an exceptional stage for this celebration. The island has long been a gathering place for sailors and enthusiasts from around the world — most recently hosting the Dragon Gold Cup in 2021 with outstanding success. With first-rate organization on water and on shore, and ample accommodation for crews and guests, Marstrand provides everything needed for an unforgettable event.

The Centenary Jubilee will not only commemorate a century of Dragon sailing — it will celebrate the friendships, the craftsmanship, and the enduring beauty of a class that continues to unite sailors in a spirit of grace and camaraderie. Marstrand 2029 will be more than a regatta; it will be a living tribute to 100 years of shared passion for the sea.

# ESTONIA AND THE DRAGON

In recent years, Tallinn Bay has seen a rising fleet of Dragons and each season, more Dragons find their way to Estonia. The Class is enjoying a renaissance after decades of obscurity when it was dropped from the Olympic programme in 1972.

A 1949 decree required that all Olympic-class yachts in the Soviet Union be built at the Tallinn Experimental Sports Boat Factory. Located in Pirita until the mid-1970s, this factory was the largest builder of sports boats in Europe, producing nearly 3,000 vessels a year. Most were dinghies, but a significant number of keelboats were completed as well. Among them were no fewer than 989 Dragons, built between 1952 and 1972, with the first launched in the summer of 1952.

Dragon production at the Tallinn Experimental Sports Boat Factory ceased immediately after the class lost its Olympic status. Under Soviet sports policy, only Olympic classes received funding. The result was unfortunate: of nearly a thousand Dragons built in Estonia, only one has survived here under sail – a 1964 mahogany hull, number 435, originally named Dnepr and sailed by Mihhail Bobritski, then head of the Navy Yacht Club based in Tallinn. After Estonia regained independence, the boat received the sail number EST 1 in 1997. Restored at the Kalev Yacht Club by Jevgeni Kazakov, this historic Dragon continues to sail today under the name My Dream. A few more Tallinn-built Dragons may still survive somewhere in Russia, but their fate is unknown.

Estonia produced several top-level Dragon sailors within the Soviet Union, including Endel Kirsipuu, Uno Poola, Uno Sibul, and Jevgeni Kazakov. Less widely known is that between 1953 and 1963, the Soviet Union held a separate Dragon class for women. Around twenty all-female teams competed, nearly half of them from Estonia. Ester Käpa Luiga and Urve Jürjo became multiple-time Soviet champions, while Astrid Tamre also frequently fought her way onto the podium. The final women's event took place in Mariupol, then known as Zhdanov. In summer, training and regattas were held on the Baltic Sea; in autumn and winter the sailors relocated to the Black Sea, with the yachts transported either by rail or on open lorries.

I recently sat down with Jevgeni Kazakov, Estonia's "grand old man" of the Dragon class, eleven-time Estonian champion and still racing at 88.

*Kalev Vapper*

“ When I started sailing in 1963, I dreamed of a Flying Dutchman, but at the time Kalev Yacht Club had none available and instead they offered me a Dragon sitting abandoned in the ‘graveyard’ behind the workshop. Luckily, the skilled workshop crew Kiil, Raun, and Toppi helped me bring her back to life. By the end of the summer, we had her seaworthy again. The boat was named Aegna, sail number SR7.

I only sailed her briefly that autumn, because the following spring I received an even better boat – Asta Veldre’s former Dragon. She was a Norwegian-built Dragon named Kräsuli, sail number 3, and I sailed her for three seasons.

In my third year, Endel Kirsipuu, the top Dragon sailor in Estonia, invited me to join his team for the Soviet Championships. I was surprised, but I went and we won bronze. Our second place in the Cup races earned me the title of Master of Sport. Crew needed to achieve the norm twice; helmsmen only once.

We agreed that in local regattas I would helm my own Dragon, but internationally I would serve as his spinnaker man. Kirsipuu retired from sailing in 1969, and I inherited all his gear along with his mahogany Dragon III, by then carrying the number SR634. With her I began helming at the Soviet Championships. That year an impressive sixty-nine Dragons lined up at the start.

The top eighteen advanced to the final and I scraped in as the last qualifier, finishing just ahead of ten-time Soviet champion Viktor Poppel. Ultimately, I placed seventh in my first major event.

The Estonian Championships were major affairs in those days – thirty-one Dragons competed for the national title in 1970. When the 5.5R class was removed from the Olympics, many of its top sailors migrated to the Dragon, among them Mihhail Bobritski, Aleksander Tšutšelov, and Vello Räime. Räime won the title that year and I placed second.

1972 was the Dragon's final Olympic year. I had just been accepted into the Soviet trade unions' national team reserve and received permission to build a new yacht at the Tallinn Sports Boat Factory. I worked on that boat from morning til night, and when the hull was finished, the renowned measurer Heino Kuivjõgi came to inspect it. After completing the measurement, he wanted to measure it again. Once he finished the second round, he just nodded and said: "Well, well, when they try, they really do know how to build boats."

With that yacht, I finished second at the 1972 Soviet Championships, third at the Baltic Regatta, and won the Soviet Cup. And then, suddenly, came the announcement the Dragon was no longer Olympic

Class. Dragons were scrapped or sold, many of them to Russia. Within a couple of years almost all Dragons vanished from Estonia. I switched to the Soling.

The revival began in 1997. I was offered a neglected Dragon at the Kalev Yacht Club workshop. Restoration would cost 10,000 dollars. We shook hands, and just like that, I was a Dragon sailor once again.

In 1998 I approached the Finns with the idea of participating in Estonian Championships. After all, one cannot race alone. The ever-enthusiastic Timo Nurmilaukas embraced the idea and promised to bring not only Finnish teams but other strong Dragon crews as well. He persuaded Paul Richard Høj Jensen, Denmark's multiple-time Dragon world champion and winner of the Soling class at the 1980 Olympic regatta in Tallinn. And to universal astonishment, Denmark's Prince Henrik joined Jensen's crew. Jensen's Dragon arrived in Tallinn aboard the prince's royal yacht.

That year next to my Dragon eight Finnish boats and the Danish team lined up in Tallinn. A small mishap struck when my crew, Nikolai Poljakov and Sven Kochberg, discovered at the top mark that the spinnaker had been left ashore, forcing us to sail the first two races without one. Even so, we finished 5th and 4th, and 3rd overall. This marked the beginning of a new era. Soon

we were travelling to regattas across Finland and Europe.

At one-point Jaak Unnuk convinced me to sell my beautifully restored wooden Dragon to him and order a new one from Petticrows in England. But fate is kind: later I reacquired my Tallinn-built mahogany *My Dream* and have restored her to her former glory now. She's very dear to me and I've known her since 1964, back when Mihhail Bobritski sailed her.

In 2001 I began pitching the idea of hosting the European Championships in Tallinn to the Finns and Danes we regularly raced with at international regattas. Thanks to Prince Henrik of Denmark, who stated at the decisive meeting, where Denmark and Estonia were the two candidates, "We've raced in Denmark many times and will do so again, but for Estonia it would be the very first time," the decision was made in our favour. And that is how the 2004 European Championship came to Tallinn.

The most recent championship event held for Dragons in Estonia was the 2024 European Championship regatta in Pärnu, where 60 teams from 15 countries competed for the title. The participants were unanimous in their praise for the event's organisation, and with any luck we will soon see the international fleet gracing our waters again."

# Meteor

## Six decades in action and still shining bright



*With more than six decades of competitive racing under her keel, GBR402 Meteor is something of a legend and she continues to shine, including winning the 2025 Dragon Edinburgh Cup for the British Open Championship 62 years after her first Edinburgh Cup competition. We asked current owner Peter Cooke for the secret of her longevity and success:*

“ I believe that *Meteor* has probably always been a competitive boat and the evidence is that she has been well looked after by her various owners over the years. Hence there wasn't the need for a radical restoration at any point.

It is probably helpful to consider two main elements, her hull and basic structure, and her rigging/systems. Her hull seems very original - the planking and structure show no signs of any obvious replacement or major repair. That points to owners maintaining her in a good condition over the years with regular varnish refreshes and smaller repairs as needed. She also retains her windows in the cuddy and her very useful drawers in the stern, ideal for gin and tonic! Since I purchased her in 2014, we have done two full hull re-varnishings as well as keeping on top of the more minor jobs and, of course, anti-fouling every year. In recent years Katie Cole has continued that maintenance role.

On the rigging/systems side *Meteor* was already 'modernised' to a large extent when I bought her. A previous owner had retrofitted her in a Petticrows layout. We replaced wire runners with Dyneema, strengthened the anchor points for the runners (after pulling the previous anchor point out!), added a single pull furling system, and more recently adopted the modern deck level mast chock cartridge and mast step system - in part to ensure we satisfy the measurement requirements and can demonstrate that compliance easily in the top level competitions. We've fitted adjustable jumpers rather than fixed which helps compensate a slightly bent mast top!

The other significant, and possibly the most important, factor is approaching these regattas as we do with a modern boat. We keep the boat, systems, and sails in the best condition possible. And as a crew, we debrief after races and try to improve and learn from any mistakes.

In summary, she's been competitive over the years, well looked after and updated appropriately ”

# Classics Review 2025



2025 saw two major Classic regattas take place. The first was the Robbe and Berking Sterling Cup sailed in Flensburg in July and the second was the Wooden Dragon World Cup in Sanremo in September.

The Robbe and Berking Sterling Cup attracted 28 competitors from six countries. Although the event was dominated by home country German entries, and Germany has the largest fleet of Classic Dragons, sailors from three different countries occupied the first three places. First was *Nortic*, a much-travelled boat, now GER1250, but originally British (K340) and then Canadian (KC108). Her owner, Sven Kruse, bought her from the Doomernik yard after a thorough restoration documented in the IDA magazine of 2023-24. She was helmed in Flensburg by Niklaus Ganssaug. Behind her were NED185 helmed by Rob Dekeukeleire and DEN266 helmed by Frank Berg.

In Sanremo there were eleven competitors from five countries. *Meteor* (GBR402), sailed by Pete Cooke, claimed victory. Behind her were *Galatea II* (ITA12), sailed by Giuseppe La Scala and *Fei Lin's Flirtation* (GBR633) sailed by Ron James. The latter is a cold-moulded hull which qualifies for this event by being wooden, even if not carvel-planked.

Classic Dragons featured in many other events, proving that, if they have been well maintained or restored, they are fully capable of competing at the highest level. The most notable results were achieved by *Bluebottle*, sailed by Graham Bailey, which won the French Championship in Port Camargue and Cowes Week. She also finished fourth in the Gold Cup and would have won the event had there been a discard. *Bluebottle* went on to win the

Marblehead Trophy in San Tropez.

*Meteor* won the Edinburgh Cup, the British Championship, as well as the Wooden Dragon World Cup. Otherwise, the lakes in Germany and Austria tend to see the greatest participation by Classics. There is also a significant population in the Netherlands, many of which are used as day sailors.

Most, if not all, the boats competing in the two Classic events have either been lovingly cared for through their lives or very fully restored more recently. It is, however, interesting to note that the average age at Sanremo was significantly higher than in Flensburg, suggesting that this is not a bar to success if the boat's condition has been maintained. There are two restorations ongoing in Great Britain of *Chime* (K380) a 1959 Borresen boat and of *Penguin* (K301) a 1958 boat built by Lallows in Cowes. Both should be in the water in 2026. They were both in poor condition, especially *Chime*, before being taken in hand. It isn't quite clear how much of Borresen's work is now extant in *Chime* after the work done by Demon Yachts, but she does look very lovely. *Penguin* is not as advanced but looks very promising. *Nereus* (K398) is now being restored in the Netherlands after languishing in England for several years.

For anyone seeking to own a genuine Classic racing boat in good condition opportunities do exist. In Britain alone there are three boats, one Pedersen and Thuesen and two Borresen, which have been substantially renovated and are now for sale after that work. I know of some other similar boats in Continental Europe. Otherwise, there are plenty of boats for sale in varying states of repair, but none of them in

top racing condition. Most of them, as with *Bluebottle*, can be brought back to competitive racing but only after considerable work. Easier perhaps to get them to a level where they can partake of club racing.

The market in Classic Dragons is very opaque, and value is utterly dependent on condition. It should be possible to make comparisons with the bigger market for GRP boats. Thus, the fully competitive boats can be compared to recent GRP boats plus or minus something for the attraction of wood as a positive and the higher maintenance costs as a negative. Older GRP boats in usable condition seem to be priced at £6,000 to £10,000 depending on equipment. For a wooden boat in need of any significant work this implies that the hull has no value and the only value lies in any equipment that can be re-used. This rather brutal analysis doesn't take any account of sentiment attached to a boat.

The fashion at the top end of the Classic Dragon world is very much for Pedersen and Thuesen boats and they very definitely command a premium. There is no doubt that they were the best built Dragons of their day, probably followed by those from Abeking and Rasmussen. However, the success of *Bluebottle*, a 1948 Camper and Nicholson boat, strongly suggests that boats built by other yards can do well if renovated by a capable yard. This is also borne out by the results from the 1960s which show that boats from other yards were certainly capable of winning. The most revolutionary boat from that era was probably *Aphrodite*, built by Kelvin Savell and sailed by Lowell North, and she is still racing in Palma. The Classic world remains intriguing and complex, partly because of the very long history.

Seven decades on, the British Dragon class showcases classic wooden boats lining up alongside modern GRP builds, new owners, restoration journeys and younger crews discovering the class for the first

Few one-design classes can rival the Dragon's unique blend of heritage, performance, and community. In Sweden, the class is experiencing a vibrant renewal. Across both the west and east coasts, new boats are joining the fleet, while long-standing owners are mentoring and encouraging newcomers to take part in regattas. The Dragon's inclusive culture – a balance of professionalism and genuine camaraderie – continues to draw sailors from diverse backgrounds who value both competition and connection.

This resurgence is no accident. The Swedish Dragon Association has been deliberate in fostering an open, inspiring environment where Corinthian sailors practice and compete alongside seasoned champions, and where the Young Dragons initiative gives the next generation a clear path into the fleet. With mentorship, shared boats and crews, and active support from experienced teams, the handover between generations is already taking shape. Today, the Swedish fleet stands stronger and more diverse than it has in years - a living reflection of how the Dragon spirit combines top-level racing with an enduring sense of community.

That spirit was on full display at the Swedish Grand Prix and Swedish Championship - the defining event of the season. With its newly renovated harbour, a tight race area just outside

the marina, and an entire village rallying behind the competition, Skanör embodied what happens when a passionate sailing community meets a legendary class. Thirty-eight teams from eleven nations gathered at Sweden's southern tip for four days of racing in shifting, demanding conditions that rewarded sharp tactics, calm focus, and steady hands at the helm.

From the outset it was clear that GER 1221 *Sapphire IV*, sailed by Jan Woortman with Markus Koy and Diego Negri, had the pace and consistency to control the fleet. They went on to secure overall victory in the Grand Prix with a performance that set the benchmark throughout the week.

Behind them, the battle for the Swedish Championship added an extra edge. SWE 800, Jan Secher with Richard Sydenham and Gerard Mitchell, sailed with composure and speed to take the national title and secure second place in the Grand Prix. Third overall went to SUI 355, Jan Eckert and crew, completing the international podium.

The Corinthian fleet also left their mark. SWE 330, Team Young Dragons – Albin Boman, Ellen Boman, AnnTherese Johansson and Dennis Fonseca Karlsson – delivered a remarkable week, winning gold in the Corinthian division and bronze in the Swedish Championship. Their energy and results confirmed the strength of the next generation coming through. Corinthian silver went to SWE 416, Martin Pålsson's

team, with GER 1256, Tanja Jacobsohn and crew, taking bronze.

Onshore, the hospitality matched the racing. With an entry fee deliberately kept low, daily breakfasts, after-sailing gatherings and a memorable regatta dinner, Skanörs Båtklubb once again showed how a small club with just 350 members can deliver a world-class regatta. The Harbour Committee's support in moving boats and adjusting harbour logistics at the height of summer was crucial and deserves the highest praise.

The verdict from the fleet was unanimous: Skanör 2025 set a new standard for how Grand Prix events can be run – competitive racing on the water, warm camaraderie ashore, and a reminder that the Dragon spirit thrives as much in small harbours as on the biggest international stages.

The Asia/Pacific can be a major growth area for the worldwide Dragon fraternity, and it is good to see this fact being recognised.

The Prince Phillip Cup will be held January 2026 in Hobart, Tasmania and in February 2027 it will be in Lake

Macquarie, a couple of hundred kilometers north of Sydney. This is a stunning venue and the first time our Dragon fleet has been hosted by the Lake Macquarie YC. are high, so far there are 40 boats registered for the winter racing. The schedule is for three winter series to take place in Puerto Portals, followed by the Copa Mediterraneo in February and ending with the Gold Cup in March. The preparations are intense and it is set that Puerto Portals will deliver a one-of-a-kind racing venue and schedule. The winter racing will not end in March though, as the Princess Sofia regatta will take place on the last weekend of March at the Real Club Nautico Palma and the Palmavela early in May.

In terms of the fleet, numbers have stayed steady with no big additions or losses. Due to the big events being hosted on Mallorca, the interest for the Dragon has re-surfaced. There are some wooden Dragons that have been restored on the island and sail regularly from RCNP. The interest remains and it is great to see how the class is consolidated on Mallorca. The past-year confirms the international influence of the Dragon class events in France. On the sporting front,

foreign participation remains strong and of a very high level, largely occupying the podiums of the French

Our objectives for 2026 will be to maintain and if possible, strengthen this attractiveness, which is very important for the organising clubs of these regattas. In addition, the help provided by the France Dragon Association in recent years to the organisation of training and events outside the regatta calendar is bearing fruit: in three years, the number of participants has increased by 50%. We are going to strengthen this effort to mobilise the clubs, their resources on the water, their coaches, in order to continue this dynamic. The challenge now remains to convert this increase in the number of sailors into an increase in the number of boats on starting lines, and to encourage more French crews to take part in events outside their home waters, in France and abroad.

Germany also made itself felt on the international stage. Dirk Pramann claimed the Dragon Gold Cup, and the Corinthian Trophy went to Germany as well—quietly confirming what many competitors already

sense: the standard is high, the field is deep, and nothing comes for free.

Just as important is the atmosphere within the fleets. The Dragon has always been about more than the next shift on the beat, and in 2025 that part felt especially alive again—seen most clearly at the Drachenhumpen on Ammersee, which put 50 boats on the line and reminded everyone why this event is considered legendary.

With strong interest at home, places are decided through a national selection process based on ranking. And in the background, preparations continue for an even bigger marker on the calendar: the Dragon Gold Cup 2027 in Travemünde.

The action then moved to the water at Easter on Lake Thun. Unfortunately, Swiss participation in the subsequent Lake Constance regattas in Staad, Überlingen, and Steckborn was very low. The Alpencup, a tune-up race for the following Swiss Championship on Lake Thun, was better attended. The TYC youth group, under expert guidance, completed eight races across three classes in two days under fantastic conditions, earning high praise from the participants and corresponding applause at the awards ceremony. The international team, sailing under the British flag, Ivan Bradbury's GBR 375 with crew Lars Hendriksen and George Leonchuck, won convincingly.

It used to be said that the winner of the Alpencup would never win the Swiss Championship. Far from it, this time too, GBR 375 won the International Swiss Championship after seven races in three days and fantastic conditions, ahead of SUI 297 Martin Knapp (TYC), Marc Jost (TYC), Andreas Keller (TYC) and BEL 80 Ben van Cauwenbergh (RYCB),

Nadia Deferm (RYCB), Tim Vanroelen (RNSYC).

For the first time this year, the title 'Swiss Champion' was awarded to the best Swiss boat. Swiss Sailing's decision came rather last-minute and sparked considerable discussion among sailors. Many believe the best boat should win and hold the title.

Therefore, the title went to SUI 297 Martin Knapp (TYC), Marc Jost (TYC), Andreas Keller (TYC) ahead of SUI 2 Francois Bopp (SNG), Simon Fry (SNG), Ivo Todorov (SNG) and SUI 320 Garlef Baum (TYC), Markus Bohren (YCZ), Hannes Eugster (YCZ).

The season concluded, as always, with the Herbstpreis. The weather was decidedly autumnal, with fog and a mirror-like lake. Soon, however, a light breeze began to ripple the water, and the first rays of sunshine broke through the fog. With winds of 8-10 knots, three races were sailed on Saturday. Due to the picturesque sunset behind the Stockhorn mountain, shrouded in mist, the final race was shortened, so the return to the harbour for a well-deserved after race beer and the following fondue wasn't too long. A light-wind race was held on Sunday.

*Note:* The 2026 Swiss Championship will take place from September 2nd to 6th at the RVB Regatta Club in Brunnen on Lake Lucerne. ## A message from the Chief Measurer



Dragon sailors - please check your mast collar, especially if you have the type you can see in the photo. During the past year's equipment inspections, I found several occasions when this type of mast collar was not in the correct position, so there was an infringement of the CR 6.103, which in some cases resulted in a protest. The rule reads:

**"CR 6.103** - A durable mark of optional material, of 50mm longitudinal and 20mm athwartships dimension, in colour clearly contrasting with the surrounding area, shall be fixed on deck on each side

of the mast opening in such position, that the foreside of the mast shall not be capable of being moved outside the limits of these marks. See Diagram on Page 22 (of the class rules).

Movement of the mast within these limits shall be restricted by filling pieces or bolts fixed in such a way that they cannot be removed while racing."

On the above picture you see

the mast collar with which I had the problem more often. On that solution there is a screw only on the front of the collar and that one is not in contact with the mast spar so it loosens or the gluing is too old it can move from the original position up or downward. If that happens you can be faced with some rectification work before the first race, or in worst case a protest after a successful race.

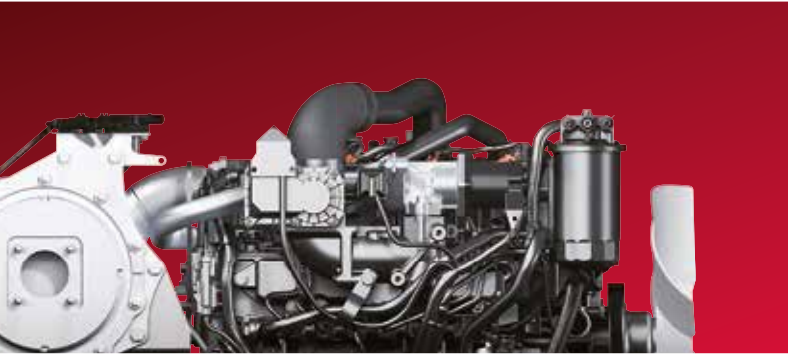
